## **How to travel to Nürnberg?**

### **By Plane**

About 15 to 20 minutes by taxi or underground to the Hotel

### **By Train**

Main Station Nürnberg

Nuremberg is on the ICE route (fast train) from Frankfurt to Munich.

The ICE train leaves from Frankfurt Airport approx. every half hour (journey time approx. 2,5 hours)

### **By Car**

Nuremberg is located at the intersection of several motorways and is therefore easy to reach from all directions

## If you arrive earlier or stay longer?

- Excursion to "Franconian Switzerland" – <https://fraenkische-schweiz.com>
- Visit to Bamberg: The old town is notable for its well-preserved buildings dating from the 11th to 19th centuries, including the Old Town Hall, which is decorated with façade paintings and is located on an island in the Regnitz River, accessible via arched bridges. The Romanesque Bamberg Cathedral, whose construction began in the 11th century, has 4 towers and numerous stone sculptures – <https://en.bamberg.info>
- Visit to Würzburg: Würzburg is famous for its Baroque and Rococo style buildings, especially the 18th century Würzburg Residence, with magnificent rooms, a large fresco by the Venetian artist Tiepolo and a richly decorated staircase. With its numerous wine taverns, wine cellars and wineries, as well as the characteristic Bocksbeutel, Würzburg is the heart of the Franconian wine region <https://www.wuerzburg.de>

## Remarks

The so-called **Nuremberg Trials** took place in Nuremberg after the end of World War 2: It was historic Courtroom 600 of the Regional Court where leaders of the Nazi regime had to answer for their crimes before the International Military Tribunal between November 20, 1945 and October 1, 1946. The trials had an enormous influence on the development of international criminal law right up to the present. The Memorium Nuremberg Trials is an information and documentation center which is located on the top floor of the courthouse. It provides insights on the defendants and their crimes, the Subsequent Nuremberg Trials of 1946-49, and the impact of the Nuremberg Trials until today.

**Southern Germany's biggest rock-cut cellar** maze at the foot of the castle:

In the year 1380, Nuremberg's rock-cut cellars were mentioned for the first time in a document defining a building law. It said that everybody who was brewing beer in his house had to have a cellar „zehen schuch tieff und sechzehen schuch weit...“ (i. e. “ten feet deep and sixteen feet wide“). For centuries after, the cellars were used to store beer. The red sandstone into which the citizens cut their cellars in the following centuries turned out to be very stable. Thanks to the clever construction of pillars standing perfectly above each other, the maze-like cellar-vaults even stood firm against the bombs of the Second World War. Thousands of Nuremberg's citizens came here for shelter and thus survived the inferno that came upon the city on January, 2nd 1945.

Today, the rock-cut cellars are again partly used to ripen and store the specialty beers and beer schnaps made by the [“Hausbrauerei Altstadt Hof“](#).
